About three years ago (my sophomore year of high school) was my public high school's art show - that made me start taking drawing more seriously. I loved seeing how happy it made everyone. October of 2013 was when I started my art account on Instagram. I saw an art account called @colour_me_creative and she had almost a million followers at the time. I figured it would be a great way to share my artwork.



WHAT/WHO WOULD YOU SAY YOUR BIGGEST INSPIRATION IS?

At the moment, I'm mainly inspired by artists who are signifigintly better than me. I follow a good amount of talented artists on Instagram and constantly seeing their work is a huge motivator. Some of my fave artists are Will Cotton, Agnes Cecile, Ali Cavanaugh, Casey Baugh, Henrietta Harris, Charmaine Olivia, and Daniel Maidman. They all have very distinct/different styles. I never get tired of seeing their work!

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE ENVIRONMENT TO DRAW IN?

90% of the time you'll find me in my bedroom, sitting at my desk, blasting my Spotify haha. I love drawing outside in the sunlight but it's hard for me - I use reference pictures on my phone for basically all of my work and the sunlight can make it hard to see my screen. I'd rather be by myself because I don't like people breathing down the back of my neck watching me draw.
